



% saying, in the future, each of the following will have a ___ in solving the biggest problems facing the country




Parties are deeply divided on future worries and priorities




Public has mixed views on the impact of having a majority nonwhite population by 2050

% saying having a majority of the population made up of blacks, Asians, Hispanics and other racial minorities by the year 2050 ...




Most Americans predict reduction or total loss of Social Security benefits
